

## RAIN REPORT COMPILED BY GARY HANAUER

A flood advisory has been issued for western Alameda County, northern San Mateo County, southwestern Contra Costa County, and San Francisco. According to the National Weather Service's official warning, "some locations that will experience flooding are San Francisco, Oakland, Fremont, Hayward, Berkeley, Richmond, Daly City, San Mateo, San Leandro, Redwood City, Alameda, Union City, Palo Alto, South San Francisco, Newark, San Bruno, Pacifica, Menlo Park, Foster City, and San Pablo."

A lot of rain has also been falling in Southern California since Sunday. In fact, their rain totals are topping the Bay Area's in some cases.

TIP: Do not attempt to cross flooded roads. Turn around and find an alternate road or simply go back. Just 12 inches of rain can sweep your car away during the kind of rain we are experiencing.

**Through 8 p.m., up to nearly 6 inches of rain has fallen in the rainiest spots in the Bay Area!!!**

Flash flooding is starting to be reported in various parts of the Bay Area.

A flash flood warning has been issued -- and now extended -- for Petaluma and Penngrove.

Another flood flood warning is in effect for Boyes Hot Springs, El Verano, and Temelec.

Peak wind gusts of 65 miles per hour are being recorded in the San Francisco Bay Area. The SF airport's reading was 61 mph at 5:13 p.m.

TIP: NEVER use candles during a power outage. They often cause fires during outages, according to a warning issued by the Weather Service for Northern California today. Instead, use flashlights.

As of 8 p.m., rain is falling at a tremendous rate in the recent fire burn areas.

In the Nuns Burn Scar, left by one of the devastating Wine Country Fires in Sonoma County, rain is coming down at .3 inches every 15 minutes!

So far, the Atmospheric River that's hitting Northern California this week has killed four people in traffic accidents.
