

## **TERROR ON SKYLINE**

A pair of hikers was transported to a hospital on the evening of Oct. 21 after they were reportedly found naked and chasing people on Skyline Boulevard while under the influence of hallucinogenic drugs. San Mateo County Sheriff's Office deputies searched the men's backpacks that evening and reportedly found 720 doses of suspected lysergic acid diethylamide in their possession. The men have been identified by the Sheriff's Office as Roger Daniel Jin, a 28-year-old South San Francisco resident, and Alvin Tze Yang Tse, a 30-year-old East Palo Alto man. The Sheriff's Office charged the men with drug possession and intent to sell the drugs. The latter charge constitutes a felony. ## **PICKPOCKET FLEES COURTROOM**

Tashira Huntley, a 28-year-old San Francisco woman who pleaded no contest to charges of burglarizing shoppers in Half Moon Bay and Daly City in July, reportedly fled the courtroom on Friday before she was due to receive her sentence. Huntley reportedly worked with others, including her younger sister, to take credit cards from shoppers' wallets after others in her group pretended to bump into them and distract them. The group stole predominantly from elderly women. There were four victims and the alleged theft group charged more than \$15,000 on the cards at shops in San Mateo and Colma. Huntley was slated to receive no more than one year in county jail after her plea of no contest this summer. ## **PB&M SANDWICHES**

During the Great Depression, people valued high-calorie combinations of protein and fat. Meat and dairy were costly, and consuming enough energy could prove challenging. Enter peanut butter and mayonnaise on white bread. The combination became a staple in Southern households in the United States and, in some regions, it was as ubiquitous as peanut butter and jelly. For the next 30 years or so, the PB&M was a favorite in many American kitchens,

perhaps because adding mayonnaise to the era's rustic, coarse nut butter may have been key for spreadability. Newspapers from the 1940s in Salt Lake City, Utah, and Troy, New York, both advised adding mayonnaise to "moisten" or "thin" peanut butter before adding bacon or shredded American cheese. Today, a seemingly limitless array of sandwich ingredients are affordable, but peanut butter and mayonnaise remain a beloved combination among the many Americans who grew up eating them.
